The Future is very exciting; there are so many different opportunities and choices of study or work options. Some pupils already have a plan. Some pupils have not thought about their Future at all.



A Day of Creativity and Innovation


Our pupils had an exciting day participating in the Knex Final and visiting Renishaw. Despite not clinching the top prize, their innovative design stood out for its creativity and originality.

Mace Cup Debating Regional Finals

On 11th March, the Wycliffe College Debating Team comprising Jason C (First Speaker for the Proposition), Isabel C (Second Speaker) and Daisy M (Rebuttal) put on a brave and eloquent performance in the third round Regional Finals of the Mace Cup, held at Cardiff Sixth Form College in front of an audience of luminaires which included the Chief Judge - Mr Winston Roddick CB, KC, Welsh Barrister and former North Wales Police and Crime Commissioner, and Sue Clements, the South Wales Branch Education Coordinator for the English Speaking Union.

As the judges pointed out, just being there was a great achievement since the teams had had to battle their way through two area debating competitions to get there.

The Wycliffe proposal that 'This House would create a compulsory national DNA database' involved the team in complex research and intellectual debate, which touched on issues ranging from the Freedom of Information Act 2012 and recent European Court of Human Rights rulings to the funding and purpose of the NHS and recent breakthroughs in forensic DNA analysis.

The Wycliffe Team passionately and conventionally presented their vision of a central DNA library that could pioneer preventative care and speed up crime detection. All three speakers combined their points of information and rebuttals with great eloquence and presence of mind in front of the live audience.

Although the home team, triumphed in reaching the London Finals, one of the judges commended team Wycliffe as'excellent'-praise indeed, given that our team was entirely comprised of Year 11 pupils against largely Sixth Form opponents.

a group of 27 pupils went on a memorable trip to Paris.




Ward's

David Prichard MBE

7th Head of Wycliffe College 1994 - 1998 & HON. OW

David Colville Mostyn Prichard MBE passed away on 2nd April, aged 89.

He taught at Monkton Combe, then at 34 was appointed Head of Port Regis. At 59 he became Headmaster of Wycliffe College and increased our numbers from 400 to 800 in four years. An inspector wrote: "Wycliffe has been transformed. The speed of this life saving transformation must be credited to the remarkable inspiration of the Headmaster." David left Wycliffe in a stronger state than he inherited it. His brief was straightforward: to increase the size of the school; to upgrade its facilities (both Wycliffe Hall and Loosley Halls were built) so that they were amongst the best in a highly competitive market; to get the school known more widely and to develop areas of excellence that would boost the school's reputation. He will be greatly missed by his loving wife, Elizabeth, his nephew, Julian, niece, Diana and his many friends.
